We protect places for wildlife

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| Audubon Society of Portland | \$5 per month will care for and feed an injured or orphaned native bird. |
| Forest Service Employees for Environmental Ethics | \$12 per month enables one staff person to spend an entire day researching problematic timber sales. |
| Native Plant Society of Oregon | \$60 per month pays for research that will help conserve Oregon's native plant species and critical habitats. |
| The Nature Conservancy | \$40 per month purchases tools used for habitat restoration work on our preserves. |
| The Wetlands Conservancy | \$15 per month purchases enough native plants to restore 1/4 acre of wetlands. |
| Central Oregon Environmental Center | \$22 per month supports river and stream restoration and educational projects. |
| WaterWatch | \$5 a month would help ensure a steady supply of water to the natural wetlands of the Klamath Basin, which supports hundreds of thousands of migrating birds each year. |

We keep people healthy

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| Opal Creek Ancient Forest Center | \$25 per month buys a year's worth of seed, compost and fertilizer for the organic gardens, which feeds people staying at Jawbone Flats. |
| River Network | \$3 per month distributes a copy of "Cancer Downstream: A Citizen's Guide to Investigating Pollution/Health Connections" to a community in need. |
| Tualatin Riverkeepers | \$20 per month purchases 13 planting shovels for planting native species. |
| Willamette Riverkeeper | \$9 per month will allow a group of students to get on the river, for a day of hands-on, guided river education and outdoor exercise. |
| 1000 Friends of Oregon | \$16 per month helps organize a network of farmers around the state who are committed to growing and raising healthy food for Oregonians. |

We reduce global warming

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| Bicycle Transportation Alliance | \$67 per month teaches a full class of school children a bike safety education class, putting them on a path to becoming lifelong cyclists. |
| BRING Recycling | \$10 per month purchases recycled art kits for an elementary classroom to make "no waste" gifts for friends and family. |
| Pacific Rivers Council | \$12 per month will pay for the valuable equipment needed to monitor salmon populations at the Knowles Creek restoration project. |
| Recycling Advocates | \$11 per month provides educational brochures, such as "Cinching the Holiday Waste" for distribution at events to encourage citizens to reduce consumption. |
| Northwest Earth Institute | \$2 a month will provide materials for 10 course coordinators to lead groups in a new discussion course, entitled Global Warming: Changing CO ₂ urse. |

What we've accomplished...

We protect places for wildlife

- Greenbelt Land Trust** Partnered with the Institute for Applied Ecology to involve students from Philomath High School in the restoration of a 58-acre property at Lupine Meadows.
- Oregon Wild** Staved off logging on 42,400 acres of roadless wildlands in Oregon.
- OSPIRG Foundation** Worked with coalition partners to alert the public to toxic mining zones (where harmful chemicals mix with river water) in the Willamette.
- Oregon Trout** Provided 4,560 Oregon schoolchildren with a hands-on watershed education experience, through OT's Salmon Watch program.
- Hells Canyon Preservation Council** Worked with 20 Whitman College students to create a reliable database of roads in the Hells Canyon Recreation Area.
- The Nature Conservancy** Purchased 6,065 acres to grow Zumwalt Prairie Preserve to more than 33,000 acres, protecting rare plants and 13 miles of streams.

We keep people healthy

- Oregon Natural Desert Association** Led 188 volunteers on 11 hikes through remote areas to remove old barbed wire fencing, and repair trails in pristine Oregon desert landscapes.
- Corvallis Environmental Center** Delivered 3,365 pounds of fresh organic produce to community programs serving families in need through the Youth Garden Project Summer Service Program.
- Oregon Environmental Council** Created legislation that has reduced the release and deposition of mercury throughout Oregon.
- Friends of the Columbia Gorge** Partnered with community groups and concerned citizens to address air pollution in the Gorge caused by vehicle emissions.
- Northwest Coalition for Alternatives to Pesticides** Worked with park staff to make eight parks in Eugene and Portland pesticide-free, protecting children and their families from exposure to toxic substances.
- Trust For Public Land** Added 324 acres of important park land in Portland for public recreational use.

We reduce global warming

- Renewable Northwest Project** Helped bring 606.5 new megawatts of wind power on-line in the Northwest in 2006, providing enough clean energy for 151,500 average Northwest households.
- reSource** Five new businesses completed WorkSmart audits and began implementing recommendations to reduce waste, cut greenhouse gas emissions and save money.
- Friends of Trees** Planted 1,539 street and yard trees in 39 neighborhoods. Cared for 14,382 native trees and shrubs at 14 natural area restoration sites.
- Siskiyou Regional Education Project** Held the Fifth Annual Siskiyou Environmental Film Festival, showing over 30 films, including *An Inconvenient Truth* and independent nature documentaries.
- Solar Oregon** Collaborated to organize the 11th annual National Solar Tour, attended by 88,300 individuals nationwide.

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
